The ABCD Rule for Observing Moles and Pigmented Lesions

ASSYMETRY: One half of the mole should look like the other.

BORDERS: Normal moles are well-defined and regular. A suspicious mole

may have notched or irregular borders.

COLOR: The color should be uniform. Abnormal moles have shades of

different colors: tan, black, red, white, or blue.

DIAMETER: Normal moles are usually smaller than the end of a pencil eraser or

a standard hole puncher in a piece of notebook paper; roughly

6 mm or ½ inch.

OTHER SIGNS TO WATCH FOR: oozing and bleeding; a change in elevation such as a sudden increase in height or a bump that appears on a mole.

Remember! If caught early, surgical excision of a malignant melanoma offers an excellent chance of a cure.
